- 2. Material and Construction:** Toy materials are crucial since babies frequently put their toys in their mouths. Choose toys that are composed of non-toxic, BPA-free materials. Because they are safe and long-lasting, wooden toys—like a wooden spinning lattu or a wooden vehicle toy—are great options. They are less likely to contain dangerous chemicals because they are usually composed of natural materials. The toy's structure should also be sturdy, free of any pieces that might break off and pose choking dangers.
- 3. Stimulating Senses:** Because babies use all of their senses to explore the environment, it's critical to select baby toys that safely excite sight, hearing, touch, and even taste. Toys with vibrant colors, soothing noises, textures, and safety for chewing can offer pleasurable and advantageous sensory experiences for the development of the senses. - 4. Creativity:** Fully automated toys are not enjoyable. Give your children things that inspire them to utilize their imaginations since they love to do so. Give them construction bricks so they may create anything they want, rather than a completed ship. You may let children use their creativity and make playing with toys that can meet these particular demands a lot of fun.
- 5. Educational Value:** For an infant's development and learning, toys are essential. Choose educational toys for your infant to foster the growth of their creativity, problem-solving abilities, and cognitive abilities. For instance, shape sorters and easy puzzles aid in the development of hand-eye coordination and spatial awareness. Play-based learning toys are incredibly essential since they build the groundwork for learning that happens throughout one's life.
- 6. Simple to Maintain:** Toys for babies should be easy to clean because babies and mess go hand in hand. Seek out toys that are readily cleaned or ideally, machine washable. This is especially crucial for toys that are used during mealtimes or bath times, or that babies

Longevity and versatility translate into better value for your money and fewer toys taking up room in your home. The best toys are those that allow for a variety of play styles or that adapt to your child's developing skills. For instance, when a baby gets older, a beach munchkin bucket may be used for creative play or teaching them about amounts, in addition to basic fill-and-dump activities.
8. **Age-Appropriate Toys:** Whether a toy is appropriate for your baby's age should be the first and most important consideration. The suggested age range is frequently stated by the manufacturer on the box, which is a useful place to start. When purchasing a new toy for your child, take into account their temperament, habits, and behavior. Toys intended for older children should not be used by a youngster, even if they appear sophisticated when compared to other kids their own age. Rather than intelligence or maturity, safety considerations set the age ranges for toys.

### Remember the following age-appropriate guidelines

- Make sure a toy is sturdy and indestructible before giving it to a newborn or toddler. Verify that it doesn't contain:
  - ❖ Sharp edges or small pieces that can be pulled free, such as wheels, buttons, or eyeballs
  - ❖ little ends that extend to the rear of the mouth
  - ❖ strings longer than seven inches and parts that might pinch tiny fingers
- Avoid anything that can become lodged in the neck above the windpipe and create breathing difficulties, such as marbles, coins, balls, and games with balls that have a diameter of 1.75 inches or smaller.
- Toys that run on batteries have to have battery casings fastened with screws to prevent children from opening them. There are significant hazards associated with batteries and battery fluid, such as internal bleeding, choking, and chemical burns.
- Once a kid can sit up straight without assistance, most riding toys can be utilized; however, make sure to follow the manufacturer's instructions. Safety belts or harnesses should be included with riding toys, such as rocking horses and wagons, and they should be sufficiently sturdy and stable to avoid toppling over.
- Toys that are handmade or hand-me-down should be thoroughly inspected. They might not have undergone safety testing. Give your baby no painted toys manufactured before 1978, as the paint may contain lead.
- Safety regulations do not apply to stuffed animals and other toys that are offered for sale or given away at fairs, carnivals, or vending machines. Before presenting carnival toys to your baby, make sure they are free of dangerous edges and loose parts.
- To ensure they cannot be swallowed or lodged in the windpipe, toys should be big enough, measuring at least 1¼ inches in diameter and 2¼ inches in length.
- Fabric-based toys need to be labelled as flame retardant or resistant.

Selecting toys for your baby is a task that combines fun with responsibility. You may choose decisions that will help your baby's development and give you peace of mind by considering the following: age appropriateness, safety requirements, material and construction, educational value, sensory stimulation, versatility, lifespan, and ease of cleaning.
