A rock garden is a landscaped area that features rocks, stones, and drought-tolerant plants (often alpine or succulent species). Rock gardens are designed to mimic mountainous or arid landscapes and emphasize natural beauty with minimal water use and maintenance.

Types of Rock Gardens

- 1. Alpine Rock Garden
- Mimics high-altitude mountainous terrain
- Uses alpine plants and rugged rocks
- 2. Desert Rock Garden
- Uses cacti, succulents, and sand or gravel
- Ideal for arid climates
- 3. Japanese Zen Garden (Karesansui)
- Features sand or gravel raked into patterns
- Minimalist with few plants; emphasizes meditation
- 4. Tropical Rock Garden
- Uses tropical plants with large leaves
- Rocks are used for contrast, not dominance
- 5. Woodland Rock Garden
- Combines rocks with shade-loving plants
- Often set in natural forested areas

Benefits of Rock Gardens

- Low Maintenance: Requires less watering, pruning, or mowing.
- Drought Resistant: Ideal for dry climates.
- **Eco-Friendly**: Conserves water and promotes biodiversity.
- Aesthetic Appeal: Offers texture, contrast, and year-round beauty.
- Erosion Control: Rocks help reduce soil erosion on slopes.

Rock Garden Design Principles

- 1. Site Selection
- Choose a sunny or partially shaded area with good drainage.
- 2. Soil Preparation
- Use a mix of sand, gravel, and compost to improve drainage.
- 3. Rock Arrangement
- Use rocks of varying sizes for natural look
- Partially bury larger rocks for realism
- 4. Plant Selection
- Choose plants suited to local climate and soil
- Group plants with similar water/light needs

5. Spacing & Layers

- Place taller plants in the back and shorter ones in front
- Use ground covers to soften rock edges

Construction Tips

- **Drainage**: Crucial use gravel beds or drainage pipes if needed
- Rock Placement: Begin with large rocks, place them partially underground
- Pathways: Include stone or gravel paths for access and structure
- Mulch: Use gravel mulch to suppress weeds and retain moisture
- **Borders**: Use natural stone or edging to define the space

Maintenance

- Watering: Water new plants until established; minimal afterward
- Weeding: Regular removal to prevent overgrowth
- **Pruning**: Trim plants to maintain shape and health
- **Rock Cleaning**: Occasionally wash or brush to remove debris
- **Seasonal Care**: Protect sensitive plants in extreme winters

- Zen Garden Elements: Sand raking, bamboo fences, minimalist layout
