PR-124(2.4 hectare) and Wheat PBW -826, PBW-824 (2.4 hectare) as his primary crops, in line with the agro-climatic conditions of Punjab. Alongside, he cultivates sugarcane (0.80 hectare), which fetches good returns when sold to local mills. Additionally, Gurjot maintains a small portion of his land for seasonal vegetables grown mainly for family consumption.



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Integration of Dairy and Farming

What sets Gurjot apart is his ability to integrate dairy with crop farming. The fodder for cows is grown on his own (0.60 hectare) fields, reducing external expenses. In return, the cow dung is used as organic manure in the fields, improving soil fertility and reducing reliance on chemical fertilizers. This cyclical model of sustainability not only enhances productivity but also keeps farming costs manageable.

Challenges Faced

Gurjot's journey has not been without hurdles. With limited landholding, he often struggles to meet rising production costs. Market prices of wheat and paddy are unpredictable, while dairy farming demands constant investment in cattle care. Shortages of green fodder in summers and fluctuating sugarcane prices pose additional challenges. However, Gurjot's strong willpower and adaptive thinking have kept him moving forward.

Community Involvement and Learning

Gurjot also believes in sharing knowledge. He actively participates in farmer training programs organized by agricultural universities and cooperatives.
